




Shoes4Africa

How many pairs of shoes have you got in your shoe cupboard? The average American teenage girl has 15 pairs, the average teenage boy about 7. But in some of the poorest countries in the world it is not unusual for people to have no shoes, and to walk everywhere barefoot. This can be dangerous and unhealthy.

Shoes4Africa was founded by a young businessman, David Akinin, in Florida, USA, in 2005. The organization collects shoes in many countries all over the world and ships them to the Ivory Coast and other African nations, where people have no shoes.

"I lived in a poor country for thirteen years," says David. "Then I moved to America where I studied. But I could never forget the experience I had had, and the poor people I had seen. One day when I saw my overfull shoe cupboard, I had the idea to collect shoes and send them to countries where they are needed. Of course, I started with my own shoes!"

The organization grew and grew, and has collected and sent thousands of pairs of shoes. Now David is global director and the organization has eight country directors and 22 city directors. Shoes4Africa gets the money needed for packing and sending the shoes by organizing events such as sports competitions where the players pay to take part.

"Shoes4Africa has not only made life easier for poor people, it has also changed my life," says David. "I have made friends with people all over the world, people who are as motivated as I am."

Working Holidays with the National Trust

The National Trust was founded in 1895. It has over three million members and 52,000 volunteers. We protect over 300 historic buildings and monuments. We look after forests, woods, beaches, islands and villages – for ever, for everyone.

The National Trust organizes about 400 working holidays in England, Wales and Northern Ireland every year. You can build walls, clear paths, do organic gardening, or plant trees – all in beautiful countryside or on the coast. On some of our holidays you can go surfing, horse riding, or take a course in photography or painting in your free time.

Anyone and everyone

You can book a working holiday from two to seven days and it costs from £60 a week including food and a room. No experience is necessary, as you will be led by trained volunteer group leaders, who don't earn any money. You just need to enjoy working in a team, being outdoors in beautiful places – and not mind getting your hands dirty!

So, who goes on a Working Holiday? Single people and couples over 16 from many different countries come on National Trust Working Holidays. Groups are usually made up of 10 to 12 volunteers. But you can be sure everyone is very friendly and interested in having a relaxing and enjoyable holiday.

Because our family holidays are also very popular, we are offering more of them this year. These holidays mean that families can have fun and enjoy time together in the countryside, and give children the chance to experience how good it feels when they try to make the world a better place. These family holidays are for two adults and up to three children aged 8 to 16 years.



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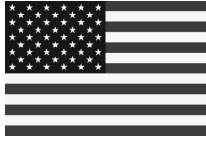

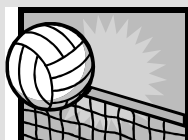
